Dear Friends of the UF Innovation Academy,

It is with immense pride and excitement that I present to you the Innovation Academy's 2023-2024 Annual Report. This year has been marked by substantial growth in our academic and co-curricular offerings, outstanding student and faculty achievements, and forward-looking initiatives that highlight our commitment to fostering an exceptional Innovation Academy.

Over the past year, our academy served more than 1,100+ students across various programs. We expanded our academic offerings to now include 29 majors, with new additions such as the Plant Science major and a Biochemistry track for Chemistry majors. Additionally, we have introduced seven new minors that our students can pursue in addition to their Innovation minor. Our faculty introduced various artificial intelligence (AI) tools into the curriculum, such as SciSpace, an AI research platform, and our home-grown NaviGator, UF's AI Large Language Model. We also integrated a self/peer evaluation system for team projects called Feedback Fruits, which enhances feedback students give and receive on their work in collaborative learning activities. These expansions reflect our ongoing dedication to providing a comprehensive and modern education.

As we turn toward the future, we are thrilled to share several new initiatives and expansions to enhance our capabilities and provide new opportunities for everyone involved in the Innovation Academy.

In December 2024, we will move to a larger space in the CSE building, strategically located in the heart of campus. This relocation will accommodate our growing team and better serve our students with some exciting new spaces. In 2025, we will launch a new business incubator to support student-led startups and entrepreneurial projects. This incubator will offer mentorship, funding opportunities, and a collaborative community to help students transform innovative ideas into viable businesses. This coming year, we will also introduce a state-of-the-art prototyping studio for students and faculty with cutting-edge tools to support design thinking, rapid prototyping, and creative exploration. Built on the success of our current program in Ireland, we will expand our study abroad opportunities to include a Senior Project course in Scotland. This program will enable students to gain global perspectives, experience different cultures, and apply their learning internationally.

In closing, I extend my deepest gratitude to our dedicated faculty, staff, and supporters whose unwavering commitment makes all these achievements possible. Together, we are shaping a brighter, more innovative future.

Maynooth Study Abroad ••••

Each fall, the Innovation Academy invites first-fall freshmen on a six-week study abroad experience in Maynooth, Ireland. From August 26 to October 7, 2023, 13 students embarked on a UF faculty-led immersion into Irish culture and innovation. Students earned six credits toward their degrees as they visited businesses such as Autodesk and PorterShed, all while forming an international mindset in their first college experience.



IA Open House

On October 25, IA opened its doors to new and returning students to explore the IA office at our Fall Open House event. Students engaged in a fun afternoon of meeting advisors and faculty, touring the innovation classroom and winning free IA merchandise. We showcased office amenities such as the 3D printer and Pitch Studio, preparing students to begin taking their IA-exclusive courses in the spring.



IA Local Internship ••••••

IA students have the opportunity to earn course credit while working with local businesses in the greater Gainesville area. Partners for the Fall 2023 internship included the Loss Prevention Research Council, Slice Engineering, ThemeWorks, Inc., and The Cade Museum for Creativity and Invention. Seventeen IA students participated in the internship program and worked on a wide variety of projects, from marketing in the 3D printing industry to understanding the inner workings of a local nonprofit.


Speaker Series ••••••••••

Twice students enrolled in IDS1940, Creativity & Design Thinking for Innovation, gathered in Norman Hall for our Spring Speaker Series. Cox Enterprises presented on human-centered design, and Slice Engineering led the Pitch Competition. Using the innovation and technical skills taught in class, five student teams pitched solutions to the potential use of 3D printing in underutilized industries to a panel of judges from Slice Engineering, PS27 Ventures and Eufinity. Judges provided professional insight into the creativity and effectiveness of their solutions, with team "Nailed It!" winning the pitch competition for their proposal to integrate 3D printing in the salon industry.

Catalyst is our summer showcase that serves as a launching point that inspires students to move their ideas forward beyond the classroom and apply their innovative solutions to the communities they live in even after the course ends.
